February 2, 2020 Sometimes I read or hear comments about the 28 core beliefs of the Adventist Church in this line: Well, I beat them over the head with 28 basic beliefs or something. 28 basic beliefs is not a question of salvation. Do not eat pork, do not swim on the Sabbath and all other Adventist beliefs. A few thoughts:1. When commenting on churches of faith, it's important to know what they really are. Our 28 Basic beliefs begin as follows: (1) The Holy Scriptures, (2) the Trinity, (3) God the Father, (4) God the Son, (5) God the Holy Spirit, (6) Creation. It ends as follows: (25) The Second Coming of Christ, (26) Death and Resurrection, (27) The Millennium and the End of Sin, (28) The New Earth. (You can easily find a whole set of beliefs online.) 2. It is true that one of our beliefs (No. 22) focuses on Christian behavior – a rich life in Christ. This belief invites us to lifestyle choices that produce Christlike purity, health and joy in our lives (but it does not prohibit swimming on the Sabbath). Most of our fundamental beliefs, however, are not about our work, but about God's redeeming work through the Life, Death, and Resurrection of Christ (No. 9). This is the only problem with salvation. 3. I totally agree that our focus should not be on the 28 basic beliefs, but on the Bible itself. We do not believe that he studies conviction; we believe that he is studying scripture. For a long time, Adventists refused to state our beliefs, saying instead: Our only religion is scripture. The reason we started spelling out our beliefs was to clean up misconceptions about who Adventists really are. (Are they Christians? Why do they keep the Jewish Sabbath? Why do they avoid certain foods?) While it was useful to articulate we believe that this has unfortunately shifted the focus of our faith on our faith rather than on the basis of our beliefs: scripture itself. In many cases, we ended up teaching our own children and students Adventist beliefs (through memorized lists and multiple-choice questions) rather than teaching them how to study scripture by verse. This results in a harmful environment in which many Adventist young people (and old people) think we are right without entering into the truth of God's word for ourselves. Surveys show that more than half of Adventists never study the Bible on their own. That's deeply ironic and the reason we're half-dying. But there's good news. Studying scripture brings life without life (D.C. 4:12). Yes, it takes longer to study the Bible than it does to memorize a list of beliefs. But the rewards are great when we run back and forth in God's Word (Dan. 12:4, KJV), as the first Adventists did.4. Meanwhile, enough sarcasm and cynicism about the Adventist faith. Jokes are too easy. Sarcasm (especially among pastors and spiritual leaders) does not build a spirit of faith; it just builds a spirit of sarcasm. Our statement of faith is not perfect (the prologue admits how much), but it is our sincere attempt to express what we have found the Bible to teach, even if our only confession is scripture. Adventists have historically been reluctant to formalize the credo. On October 8, 1861 review and Herald, J. N. Loughborough wrote: The first step of apostasy is to stand up credo and tell us what we will believe. The second is to make that credo a test of friendship. The third is to test the members with this credo. The fourth condemn as heretizes those who do not believe that creed. And fifth, start a pursuit against such. [3] Several summaries of Adventist theology were presented at different times. In 1872, a booklet was created that presented twenty-five basic principles[4] that are not intended to ensure uniformity, but to satisfy questions and correct false statements. [5] In 1931, a list of 22 basic beliefs was created[6] and published in the Adventist yearbook and subsequently in the Adventist Church Manual. In 1980, 27 basic principles were introduced by the General Conference of Denomination. Fritz Guy was secretary of the original committee that produced 27 Basics. They were discussed and adopted at the General Conference in 1980. Ron Graybill wrote the preamble. [7] They are extended in the seventh day book Adventists: The Biblical Exposition of 27 Basic Doctrines. [8] This processing does not represent the official position of the Church. [quote required] In 2005, another faith was inserted, basic faith number 11 Growing in Christ, in response to requests from Adventists in developing countries for a declaration of spiritual war. It was elected in the 2005 Adventist General Conference held in St. Louis, Missouri, giving the current total 28. Adventist theologians generally reject the verbal inspirational attitude to scripture held by many conservative evangelical Christians. They believe that instead, God inspired the ideas of biblical authors, and that the authors then expressed these ideas in their own words. [10] This view is popularly known as thought inspiration, and most Adventist members adhere to that view. According to Ed Christian, former editor of JATS, few, if any, ATS members believe in verbal inerrancy. [11] Adventists generally reject higher critical approaches to scripture. In a 1986 statement the Method of Bible Study, it calls on Adventist Bible students to avoid relying on the use of assumptions and resulting deductions associated with historically-critical methods. [12] 2. The Trinity of Godhead (Trinity) consists of the Eternal Father, the Lord Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit. [13] 3. Father God, the Eternal Father, is a personal and spiritual Being who is omnipotent, omnipresent, omniscient. He is infinite in wisdom and love. [14] 4. The Son of Jesus, christ, is God in verity. He has the same nature and essence as the Eternal Father. In addition, he took on human nature, living as a righteous man on earth, dying for the sins of mankind, rose from the dead and ascended to heaven, where he makes intercession for mankind. [15] 5. The Doctrines of Humanity 6. The creation of the Adventist Doctrine of Seventh Day Creationism is based on the belief that the introductory chapters of Genesis should be interpreted as literal Adventist belief that all earthly life originated during a six-day period about 6,000 years ago, and a global flood destroyed all land animals and humans except those rescued on Noah's Ark. [16] Although Adventists claim that creation week was a recent event, they believe the Bible speaks of other worlds inhabited by intelligent beings elsewhere in the universe that existed during the week of earth's creation. [17] Instead of being the First Creation of the Word, the Earth was most likely His last. The sons of God Job 1:6-12 are Adams of the backseason worlds meeting in God's presence somewhere in the universe. Other inhabited planets are located in the vastness of the universe, far beyond the reach of space probes from our sin-polluted solar system, quarantined due to sin infection. Adventists believe that inorganic matter originated a week ago and was changed to its present form during the week of creation. Therefore, the calculated radiometric data of standard geology are irrelevant for dating the creatures of life on Earth. [19] [20] [21] [22] Since radiometric dating, says Webster, is interpretive science, he believes that for Christian scientists it would seem logical, almost convincing, to seriously consider the Biblical account for determining the time of creation. (Different Protestant groups have different views of millennials.) As for salvation, the main statement was the Dynamics of Salvation of 1980.
